Most of us, if not all of us, are familiar with Rye Playland, which is also known as Playland Amusement Park. We went there as kids and/or as adults. We took our kids there and maybe our grandkids as well. I grew up in the Parkchester section of the Bronx. My father wanted to make sure that our mother got away from the stifling heat, so one summer we rented a house a block away from Playland.

Playland is run by the Westchester County government and sits on 280 acres of parkland. It is the only government-run, as well as the only Art Deco, amusement park in the country. It was placed on the U.S. National Register of Historic Places in 1980 and became a U.S. National Historic Landmark in 1987. Originally, in the early 20th century, the site was developed for recreational purposes along the Long Island Sound. The site included hotels and resorts as well as amusement areas. Local residents however were concerned because of the unsavory crowds that it attracted, and they prevailed. The County addressed the problem by agreeing to sponsor an amusement park at the site in 1927. Construction began right after Labor Day in 1927 with 1,000 construction workers. Eight months later, on May 26, 1928, under the leadership of Frank Darling, the park opened. Darling had previously run Coney Island and managed amusement parks in England and New Zealand. The original Park began with such familiar places as the boardwalk, the ice-skating rink, a swimming pool, two beaches and amusement park rides, some of which are still in use today.

Two of the rides that date back to the opening are the Grand Carousel and the Derby Racer. The Carousel was built in New Haven, Connecticut in 1915. It features a rare band organ that was built in Italy. The Derby Racer is one of three that are still in existence today. It rotates at 25MPH, three times the speed of a normal carousel.

There are five roller coasters at Playland today but the iconic one is the Dragon Coaster. It opened in 1929 and appears in the Playland logo. It is one of roughly 100 wooden roller coasters in operation today in the United States. The Kiddie Roller Coaster, which opened in 1928, is another classic ride .

The Boardwalk is 1-1/4 miles long and covers 7900 feet of shoreline. One attraction on the Boardwalk is the Playland Museum. An Olympic-size pool is right off the boardwalk. This summer a series of big-band concerts will take place on the boardwalk next to the pool. The Ice-Skating Rink was built in 1929, and today there are two smaller rinks plus a main rink. The New York Rangers Hockey team practiced there for many years before leaving in 2003. Playland had the distinction of displaying the Stanley Cup during the summer after the Rangers won the NHL championship in 1995. Today the rink is home to the Rye High School and the Manhattanville College hockey teams.

Presently there are 50 major rides in the amusement park and there are fees for parking and admission. County Executive Rob Astorino and Westchester County are concerned about the future of Playland because attendance is down and the cost to run Playland is between \$3-5 million dollars a year. The county has solicited and received 11 proposals suggesting a use of the Park in the future, and decision is expected to be reached at the end of 2011.

No matter what happens, if you're like me, you'll always have many happy memories of Rye Playland.
